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Chairman's introduction

s I sit to write this foreword the airwaves are full, not 'of linnets' wings', but of the poetic achievements of Seamus Heaney. Today he is 70 and the nation celebrates the life and poetry of our Nobel laureate. The Abbey is proud to have recently produced *Burial at Thebes* his translation of Sophocles' *Antigone*, a play that has a personal resonance for me as a lawyer, but one which also reminds us of our place in the literary tradition of western Europe.

An inspiration, in every sense, to the nation, Heaney continues in the tradition of Shaw, Yeats, Joyce, O'Casey, Beckett and Kavanagh. He has rekindled the artistic flame for another generation. Ever conscious of his responsibility as an artist he has never failed in his obligations to his art or to his community.

Even on institutional responsibility he is instructive. His poem *St Kevin and the Blackbird* pictures the kneeling saint with outstretched arms in penitential pose in a cell so narrow that to accommodate his extended pose one hand extends through a small window to the outside world. Opportunistically, the blackbird uses the hand-cup to lay her eggs. Appreciating his obligation to nature, Kevin remains a prisoner until the eggs are hatched and the birds have flown.

When the present board was appointed to the Abbey some three years ago we were conscious of our position as trustees of a priceless national legacy. As custodians we were obliged not only to preserve this heritage but, like the biblical good servant, we are obliged to nurture and enhance it. This report marks the achievements of the last 3 years under the leadership of Director Fiach Mac Conghail, supported by his strong management team and staff, and my thanks extend to my fellow board members all of whom have contributed greatly to this success.

I wish to acknowledge, also, the strong commitment of the Irish Government, the Department of Arts, Sports and Tourism and The Arts Council/An Chomhairle Ealaíon to supporting the mission and objectives of the Abbey Theatre.

Like St Kevin, we will all remain faithful to the task.

Artistic achievement and financial success

ver the last three years more than 370,000 people have seen 32 productions on our two stages in Dublin and on tour in Ireland, Edinburgh, London and New York. The Abbey Theatre's audiences have been excited, engaged, challenged and entertained by a great variety of work which included 7 world premieres, 4 Irish premieres and work from 6 international companies.

As Ireland's national theatre our aim is to present new plays and exciting productions to our audiences and to support this with activities, debates and events that open up the theatre to our citizens by increasing and extending participation. We aim to reflect and challenge the issues that occur in Irish society and to support our writers and artists in making sense of highlighting these concerns to our citizens and our audiences.

ONE VISION, TWO STAGES

The Abbey's programming continues to reflect on our stages 'the deeper emotions of Ireland'. From 2006-2008 we presented new Irish plays, plays from the Abbey and Irish repertoire, international classic drama, and encouraged new and diverse theatre making.

We examined the new and changing Ireland in plays like Homeland by Paul Mercier, The Grown-Ups by Nick Kelly, and Bisi Adigun and Roddy Doyle's version of Synge's The Playboy of the Western World. We explored the issues of leadership, democracy and political courage in productions of Julius Caesar, The Crucible, Kicking a Dead

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Horse, An Ideal Husband, The Resistible Rise of Arturo Ui, The Burial at Thebes, Big Love, and The Big House. We looked also to important plays by English writers Edward Bond, Caryl Churchill and Joe Penhall to examine key issues and changes occurring in Irish society. We also produced Brian Friel's exquisite versions of Chekov's Three Sisters and Turgenev's A Month in the Country.

The Abbey Theatre reengaged and collaborated with important Irish writers Bisi Adigun, Marina Carr, Roddy Doyle, Brian Friel, Seamus Heaney, Conor McPherson, Paul Mercier, Tom Murphy, Mark O'Rowe, Billy Roche, Enda Walsh. And we began to take stock of one of America's most important playwrights, Pulitzer prize-winner Sam Shepard. In this unique collaboration, Shepard has given the Abbey Theatre two world premieres and we will continue to survey his work for Irish audiences over the next couple of years.

Visiting companies enriched our programme and more than 11,000 people of all ages were introduced to the art of circus with *Aurelia's Oratorio* (France), *Taoub* (Morocco) and *Circo de la Sombra* (Franco-Catalan). We also invited the National Theatre of Great Britain's production of *Happy Days* by Samuel Beckett starring Fiona Shaw.

NURTURING TALENT, UNLOCKING POTENTIAL

The Abbey maintains the only fulltime Literary Department in Ireland, which in 2006 commissioned 16 writers. Three of these plays, *Terminus* by Mark O'Rowe, *Kicking a Dead Horse* by Sam Shepard and *Lay Me Down Softly* by Billy Roche were produced in 2007/8 and a further five will premiere in 2009.

In 2007/8 we commissioned a further 17 writers and also commissioned six short plays by younger writers, which were performed as rehearsed readings in the Peacock.

The Literary Department continue to receive, assess and respond individually to up to 300 unsolicited scripts per year. Writers of the best of these submissions are considered for invitation to the New Playwrights Programme.

The Abbey Theatre is a dynamic working environment in which theatre professionals across all disciplines work to develop their creative talents, and achieve ever greater standards of excellence and quality. We have introduced a Resident Assistant Director scheme, which supports the training and development of young and emerging theatre makers. We have also encouraged Irish theatre directors and designers to work at the Abbey Theatre. We are proud to have worked with over 300 actors in 32 productions over the last three years. In our commitment to improve quality in productions at the Abbey Theatre, we have introduced extra weeks of rehearsals for productions, more low-price previews and a fully integrated understudy system.

Táimid ag dul isteach anois i dtréimhse nua a bhfuil athrú i gceist léi, ní hé amháin d'Amharclann na Mainistreach ach d'Éirinn trí chéile freisin. Tá deis ann anois, níos mó ná riamh, le hamharclann náisiúnta na hÉireann chun léiriú a thabhairt ar shochaí na hÉireann agus chun fóram a sholáthar don phobal ina mbeadh cruthaitheacht, cumas friotail, díospóireacht agus dioscúrsa ina n-órlaí tríd. Tugann próiseas déanta drámaíochta deis $comhchruthaitheachta\ ar\ leith$ leis i gcomhair scríbhneoirí, stiúrthóirí, aisteoirí agus lucht féachana. Ceiliúrann sé agus dearbhaíonn sé cumhacht agus láithreacht an aisteora agus an scríbhneora. Is é an lucht féachana amháin atá in ann an láithreacht seo a thabhairt i gcrích. Lenár linn tá spásanna fíorúla agus pobail ar líne tar éis teacht ar an bhfód ach leanann den drámaíocht bheith ina comhchuid ar leith agus fíorthábhachtach maidir le saol cultúrtha na hÉireann.

THE ABBEY EXPERIENCE

In 2007 internationally renowned designer Jean-Guy Lecat and Irish architect John Keogan transformed the Abbey auditorium, with a new floor design and seating. This enhanced the acoustics, created an intimacy between the audience and actors and has been unanimously applauded. It has transformed the theatrical experience at the Abbey Theatre.

The Abbey is continuing to build its reputation and extend the life of its new work by touring Ireland and performing overseas. In 2008 grants from Culture Ireland supported performances in both the US and the UK. The Abbey took two productions to the Public Theater (New York); *Terminus* by Mark O'Rowe ran at of as part of the Under the Radar Festival 9—20 January, followed by *Kicking a Dead Horse* by Sam Shepard, 25 June—10 August, which then transferred to the Almeida Theatre (London), 5—20 September. *Terminus* ran at the Traverse Theatre, 3—24 August, as part of the Edinburgh Festival, where it won a prestigious FRINGE FIRST, and as a result has been invited to London, Australia, New Zealand and to return to the US. *The Seafarer* by Conor McPherson enjoyed a successful Irish tour with performances in Cork, Galway and Letterkenny.

REACHING AUDIENCES

More than 370,000 people saw an Abbey show between 2006 and 2008, an increase of 19%, while a greater number of events and activities helped to engage and deepen the relationships we have with our audiences and create conversations around issues of national and international relevance. At over one hundred Abbey Talks, theatre artists, opinion makers and stakeholders critiqued, challenged and debated issues and themes with our audiences, serving to animate the work on our stages.

Initiatives such as the Matinee Club give our senior audience members insights into productions through discussions with writers, directors and cast members. Projects with disadvantaged schools combined onsite workshops, backstage tours, and teacher support to create a direct connection between the Abbey and over 2,300 students. Crucially they have also helped to break down preconceived ideas about theatre and to foster a new generation of younger theatregoers that appreciates theatre as an art-form that they enjoy, engage with and are inspired by.

BUSINESS AND ECONOMIC IMPACT

The Abbey suffered a major crisis culminating in 2004/05 as a result of a combination of structural and systemic weaknesses. As a result, there was a wholesale process of change from the top down. The company

and corporate structure was radically altered and new management structures, systems and skills designed and installed. This major change was financially supported by the Government through the Department of Arts, Sports and Tourism (DAST) and the Arts Council/An Chomhairle Ealaíon and all debts were cleared. In January 2006, the Arts Council provided an historic 3 year investment of €25.7m, a sum ring-fenced by DAST, to the reconstituted Abbey Theatre under the direction of Fiach Mac Conghail.

What three-year funding empowered the Abbey Theatre to do was make enlightened artistic and business decisions which minimised risk and encouraged long term planning and programming, providing a solid foundation to build upon.

We have achieved year-on year growth in income (40%) and attendance (19%). The introduction of organisational and professional development programmes have informed working practices and work began to revitalize the Abbey's brand profile.

In 2008 we commissioned an Economic Impact Study to measure the specific contribution of the national theatre to the economy¹, using a model commissioned by Arts Council England. This confirmed the economic impact of the Abbey (combined direct and indirect spend, including turnover) at almost €40 million per year, generating €3.6 for every €1 of funding and between 2006 – 2008 the Abbey contributed over €118 million to the Irish economy.

NEW CHALLENGES, NEW OPPORTUNITIES

We are now entering a new period of change not just for the Abbey Theatre but also for Ireland. Now, more than ever, there is an opportunity for Ireland's national theatre to hold a mirror up to Irish society and provide a forum for creativity, expression, debate and discourse. The process of making theatre offers a special kind of communion for writers, directors, actors and audiences. It celebrates and affirms the immediate power and presence of the actor and the writer. This presence can only be fully realised by the audience. In a time of virtual spaces and online communities theatre continues to be a unique and vital component of Irish cultural life.

Our long-term strategy is to relocate to a new building at George's Dock in the Dublin Docklands. When complete, the new waterside complex will give Dublin an iconic and dynamic building reflecting the city's growing reputation as a global capital of culture and creativity. Our ambition is to produce an annual programme of 16 productions and 2 national tours, to support a thriving Literary Department, develop a major programme of Engage and Learn activity, a Studio, multiple and diverse income streams and continue to build on our national and international reputation.




